A HOME FOR THE HOLIDAYS!

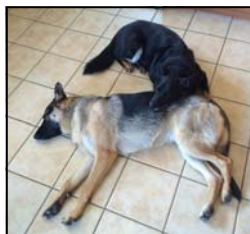
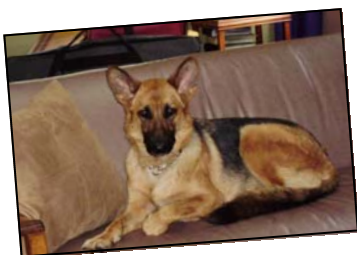

Brian's Bite-Sized Behavior Bits ~ Holiday 2014

Playing nicely with others.

Have you ever watched your dog romping around with one of his friends and wished you felt more comfortable knowing what constitutes appropriate play? Whether you have multiple dogs in your home, you take your dog to the dog park, or whether he just plays with his neighborhood buddies on occasion, there are some basic rules of canine interaction to keep in mind. I get a lot of questions about this topic so I thought it would be a good one to explore.

There is a ton of literature and many, many books and blogs that have vast amounts of information on this subject. They explore everything from the roots of canine play rituals to the intricate details of body language. While these are fascinating aspects of behavior to learn about, we'll stick to a couple of simple, practical considerations that can help guide your dog in healthy play.

When I am first teaching people what to look for, I focus on two primary concepts: intensity and joint participation. Let's look at joint participation first. If both of the dogs are interested in the interaction and want it to continue, that's a good sign. If only one of the dogs is receiving benefit and playing, as Aimee Sadler (Director of Training & Behavior at the Southampton Animal Shelter) would say "at the expense of the other dog", something isn't right. Such a scenario requires handler intervention to redirect the energy of the dog who is taking advantage of the situation. This could be as simple as calling your dog's name or telling him "no". If he is really caught up in the moment you may need to clap your hands or use something like a spray bottle to get his attention. The main thing is to avoid getting caught up in the details of play styles and behavioral nuances – these take way too long to assess in real-time. Instead, look at the entirety of the scene unfolding in front of you. Ask yourself if both dogs seem equally engaged. They may be playing different roles (such as one chasing and the other one running away), but if they're both enjoying themselves, let them be.

Secondly, be mindful of the overall intensity level of the interaction. Two dogs may be playing and having a great time and it's okay for play to even become rough at times. However, there is a range of energy that facilitates healthy interactions. If the dogs know each other especially well, and particularly if they live together, they may be able to play much more intensely than they would with a dog they just met. Like any good heating and cooling system, there is a comfortable temperature range that is maintained by a thermostat. Most dogs will function as their own energy thermostat by pausing during play, shaking like they are wet which helps dissipate energy, as well as other behaviors like sniffing the ground or turning away for a time. However, you will need to step in on occasion if their energy is spinning out of control and they aren't checking themselves. Elevated levels of arousal have led to many a dog fight. It's where the "it's all fun and games until someone ends up in a cone" saying comes from.

Quite frankly, most dog interactions do not need to be thwarted by people; such interference can lead to a lot of unnecessary frustration between the dogs and sometimes causes fights. Remember: if the play is characterized by joint participation and fits within a comfortable range of intensity, sit back, relax, and enjoy the show!
